Purpose. The 5-Year and Annual PHA Plans provide a ready source for interested parties to locate basic PHA policies, rules, and requirements concerning the PHA's operations, programs, and services. They also inform HUD, families served by the PHA, and members of the public of the PHA's mission, goals, and objectives for serving the needs of low-, very low-, and extremely low- income families.

Applicability. The Form HUD-50075-SM is to be completed annually by **Small PHAs**. PHAs that meet the definition of a Standard PHA, Troubled PHA, High Performer PHA, HCV-Only PHA, or Qualified PHA **do not** need to submit this form. Note: PHAs with zero public housing units must continue to comply with the PHA Plan requirements until they closeout their Section 9 programs (ACC termination).

Definitions.

- (1) **High-Performer PHA** - A PHA that owns or manages more than 550 combined public housing units and housing choice vouchers (HCVs) and was designated as a high performer on both the most recent Public Housing Assessment System (PHAS) and Section Eight Management Assessment Program (SEMAP) assessments if administering both programs, SEMAP for PHAs that only administer tenant-based assistance and/or project-based assistance, or PHAS if only administering public housing.
- (2) **Small PHA** - A PHA that is not designated as PHAS or SEMAP troubled, and that owns or manages less than 250 public housing units and any number of vouchers where the total combined units exceed 550.
- (3) **Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) Only PHA** - A PHA that administers more than 550 HCVs, was not designated as troubled in its most recent SEMAP assessment and does not own or manage public housing.
- (4) **Standard PHA** - A PHA that owns or manages 250 or more public housing units and any number of vouchers where the total combined units exceed 550, and that was designated as a standard performer in the most recent PHAS or SEMAP assessments.
- (5) **Troubled PHA** - A PHA that achieves an overall PHAS or SEMAP score of less than 60 percent.
- (6) **Qualified PHA** - A PHA with 550 or fewer public housing dwelling units and/or HCVs combined and is not PHAS or SEMAP troubled.

B.1(b). New Activities

The Lexington Housing Authority will continue to work at providing safe and secure housing for all, free from discrimination. We will ensure equal opportunity and affirmatively further fair housing by providing a suitable living environment free from harassment and regardless of race, color, national origin, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, disability, ancestry, genetic information, marital status, veteran or active military status, age, familial status, source of income and domestic violence.

To obtain and follow these goals and objectives, the Lexington Housing Authority has outlined the following goals and objectives:

1) Reposition Public Housing Inventory

Mixed Finance Modernization or Development

The Lexington Housing Authority may apply for Mixed Finance Modernization or Development for its Countryside Village property – 60 units of elderly/disabled housing as part of its repositioning process. The timetable for the application for Mixed Finance Modernization or Development is pending the approval of RAD Blend application. If approved, we anticipate possible application in late 2026/early 2027. We anticipate using our Faircloth as applicable.

Demolition and/or Disposition

The Lexington Housing Authority will be submitting an application to the SAC for disposition of its Countryside Village property. We will be transferring ownership of the properties by ground lease via negotiated transfer at below fair market value. We will use project-based vouchers to support these units.

The affected units are:

- 1) The entirety of Countryside Village, units 2A-6J Countryside Village. Minimal accessibility features in a few units. No 100% accessibility.

The disposition of these properties will allow us to plan for an improved operation of these buildings, and to continue providing housing to low-income households.

These units – mostly built in 1979– are all one bedroom units.

The age of the properties with many nearing 45 years old require an increasing need for repairs at these properties. A physical needs assessment from 2018 identified improvement needs of the properties' roofs, gutters, unit bathroom fixtures, lighting, and smoke detectors to name a few. The LHA will have to address these needs to continue providing adequate housing to their residents.

The Housing Authority issued an RFP for A/E services to a complete needs assessment and master planning. The robust needs assessment will help guide our application and supplement the evidence of the needs of the property.

The disposition of these units will allow the LHA to develop a financial plan that addresses the existing aforementioned capital needs, and to provide adequate operating dollars in the long term. Access to TPV replacement vouchers will ensure that the same level of affordability is offered to the community, and that residents remain in place. The disposition of these scattered site units will preserve 60 units of elderly housing in Lexington. These units offer a unique opportunity to house low-income households in Lexington – a high-cost town.

Anticipated timeline:

September – LHA Board authorizes submission of disposition application to HUD SAC via PIC

October – Anticipated Approval Date from HUD SAC

November 1 – Complete the conversion.

Conversion of Public Housing

The Lexington Housing Authority is planning on converting its 17 scattered site federal public housing to tenant-based assistance through a Section 18 Disposition application. This will be a partial conversion of our AMP-1 through a RAD-Blend process. We are reviewing available conversion options for the remaining 60 public housing units. LHA is reviewing options for the conversion of the remaining AMP-1 public housing to project-based and tenant-based vouchers.

B.1(c) Project-Based Vouchers

The Lexington Housing Authority plans to use a portion of its HCV allocation as new project-based vouchers through the demolition/disposition application. We anticipate that 17 HCV vouchers will become project-based through the conversion. We are also exploring the possibility of converting approximately 20% of our existing mobile vouchers to PBV to assist in adding additional affordable units in Lexington.

C.1 Resident Advisory Board (RAB) Comments

The Lexington Housing Authority solicited comments from the residents of Countryside Village, AMP 067-1. Comments generally were regarding the upcoming RAD Blend application and transition to a subsidy-based funding model. Questions included changes to their current rent, the likelihood of having to move and other impacts/disruptions they might experience. All questions were answered thoroughly and staff were able to explain the benefits of this transition and ease fears of any personal impacts.

Discussion included possible capital improvements to the site, possible new development and other lasting improvement to guarantee the condition of the units remains safe for the next 20 years.

Capital improvements residents would like to see include:

- Central air conditioning/heat pumps
- New kitchens
- Increased living sq footage
- New laundry rooms
- Improved community area – serve a greater purpose
- Elevator
- Bus shelters
- Bike shelters


